## **Thomas Biedermann Earns the ICCF SIM Title**

In July, Thomas Biedermann earned the title of Correspondence International Master (IM). He has now added to that the Senior International Master (SIM) title, as confirmed via email from International Correspondence Chess Federation (ICCF) Qualifications Commissioner, Neil Limbert. Both of Tom's Medals and Title Certificates will be awarded at the ICCF Congress to be held in October in Antalya, Turkey.

Tom earned SIM norms in three tournaments totaling 32 games to earn the SIM title. Tom achieved his first SIM norm in the category VII World Championship Semifinal 04 (WC32SF04) tourney where he scored 8-½ points, ½-point above the SIM performance level. He followed that up with a SIM performance in the category VIII 2008 Interzonal Team Tournament Board 5 (Interzonal TT/5) event equaling the standard of 6 points. His final norm was earned in the category V WebServer MasterNorm 044 (WS/MN/044) where he equaled the SIM requisite of 8-½ points. Tom was undefeated in these three tournaments with 14 victories and 18 draws in all. The links to the crosstables of the cited tournaments are as follows:

The following game is taken from the WebServer MasterNorm which clinched the SIM Title for Tom. This is one where endgame skills are critical and demonstrates why he is so tough to beat. Middlegame skirmishes leave the black pawns in shambles. Tom correctly judges that the Knight vs. Bishop endgame is favorable for the steed after the trade of queens. His threats against the weak black pawns results in his winning one then a second while his opponent is helpless to stop the King from penetrating into the enemy camp. The final simplification into a tablebase ending is quite instructive as well as esthetically pleasing.
